Presidents "Trip" Report

Missing in the Bush

Well today this may have been more likely than not. We planned to travel from Cunnamulla to Lightning Ridge. As you do, you consult the maps, navigation aids and tourist brochures. After enquiring at the Cunnanulla Information Centre and discovering that the least travelled road "appeared" to be a well maintained bitumen and gravel road servicing local farms we thought, yes this seems a more interesting way than up the highway.

We always blame Trevor's brother for our misadventures, he has a natural allergy to the black top. Doesn't Job Gate Road have a nice ring to it? So does the Culgoa Floodplain National Park. The hint is in the title as to where the issues lay. Great single lane bitumen road driving through the Mitchell Plains until we get to the National Park. This park straddles the Queensland and New South Wales border. I'm sure there will be an interesting pastoral history involved here.

After a small misdirection, one of many I might add, we find ourselves at the first point of interest, natural shallow artesian pools. The only thing of interest photographically were some scattered collections of tall purple pea plants. After consulting the "Plants of Inland Australia" by Phillip Moore, they are confirmed as Broughton Peas. Particularly fine specimens at that. Tall and very colourful. Next spot was the Nebine Creek, a nice spot for lunch amongst the Coolibah trees. The shallow creek was very full and murky as they are up this way. Again another photo opportunity.

Onwards towards more interesting and challenging variable terrain. Rocky ground, sandy creeks, low hanging trees, tall grasses and soft shrubs. More confusion, we find ourselves travelling along the fenced boundary of the two states. Tourist maps say, no wrong way, navigation aids say, follow the fence. So, back we go, after finding a suitable turn around spot.







Yes, we have found it! The first of two huts. This one is remarkably well built, tin pressed ceilings and walls, numerous bedrooms and verandahs. The Hillview Hut was surrounded by a high fence to keep the animals out, fortunately it wasn't locked. What an isolated place to live. Cunnamulla was at this stage 190 kms west. As we get deeper into the park the roads are less maintained, to the extent that all you can see are a faint set of wheel marks flattening the, metre high, fairy grass.

Next comes the inevitable, yes you guessed it from the name of the National Park, the flood plains. There was some muddy puddles but one was more challenging and Whoops we are bogged, with a three and a half tonne caravan behind. This is why you travel with Mark, he loves playing in the mud. Thanks for the tow out, and through three consecutive bog holes. Wow did that mud stink! It literally smells like cow poop, sticky stinking grey mud.

We eventually come to a better section of the road and camp at Redbank Hut. This one seems like an outstation hut, much more basic but still intact. Again another interesting place to photograph. This hut, coming from the east end is much more accessible and would prove to be a great opportunity for star trails but alas not, for us a full moon.

Not sure how many kms we have travelled but I have a feeling it may have been more prudent to go the other way. But then again we have some very unique, amazing photos of the Culgoa National Park and another opportunity to camp in Australia's amazing outback.

Honestly you need to add this stuff to your bucket list.

Next stop Lightning Ridge. Maybe we will soak the dust off in a spa.



IN 2002 WAS AWARDED, PHOTOGRAPHIC HONORS OF LAPS AND IN 2003 AND IN 2004 PHOTOGRAPHIC HONORS AAPS.

IN1994 WAS THE MOST SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITOR IN THE BALLARAT NATIONAL AND AGAIN IN 1997.

IHAVE EXHIBITED PRINTS IN NATIONALS IN EVERY STATE IN AUSTRALIA EXCEPT NORTHERN TERRITORY AND 2 INTERNATIONALS.

HAVE BEEN ON A PANEL OF 3 JUDGES FOR THE BALLARAT NATIONAL 1986, 1988 AND 2991, ALSO WARRAGUL NATIONAL MANY TIMES AS WELL AS MANY VICTORIAN CLUBS.







Beginning with a Box Brownie as a youngster, and encouraged by my father, I

worked my way through Kodak and Werra rangefinder cameras until I could

afford to buy my first SLR in 1975. I always used slide film, recording

holidays as well as taking images specifically for use in teaching

Geography. Travel has always been important, and after my husband died in

1993 I was determined to see those areas of the world I had become

particularly interested in - the polar regions and neighbouring cold lands

with glaciers and ice sheets. Such travel has included visits to the High

Arctic, Antarctica, Iceland and Scandinavia; Alaska, the Pacific North West,

New England and the South West Desert regions of the USA; Germany; Canada

and New Zealand. Many of these experiences have since been documented in

photobooks. I joined the camera club movement in 1998 and enjoyed improving

my skills, changing to digital cameras in 2006. After my 2010 trip to

Svalbard and Greenland I entered several photos of polar bears in the

Ballarat National photo competition run by BCC (since discontinued) and

gained 1st, 2nd and Highly Commended placings in the Nature section. Three

of the bear photos received international acceptances at Vigex and at

Cheltenham, UK. I joined the non-competitive Victorian Nature Photography Group in 2001.

My professional training combined with photography has enabled me to present

talks to community groups, raising awareness of the wider world and the

interaction between all aspects of the environment. I often provide images

to the Ballarat Field Naturalists' newsletter following excursions to the

bush, and occasionally my photos have been used by Roger Thomas in his

"Nature Notes" column of the Ballarat Courier. Being "out there" is as much

a part of my enjoyment as achieving a successful image.
