Monthly Comp Summary September 13 - Judge - Liz Cocks

"Photography isn't a competition..."

Members might like to think about the value of competition in photography. I was prompted to think more about this when I read the article under this heading by David Ward in the August issue of the UK magazine *Outdoor Photography*.

I have taken photos since I was a teenager, and during my working life used many of them as a teaching aid for illustrating Geography lessons. I joined the camera club movement 15 years ago and in that time have progressed philosophically from being serious about my monthly entries, to mentally querying the comments by judges, and sometimes the competence of those judges, until now when I find I agree with many of David Ward's comments, selections of which I quote here.

Winning a competition might seem to be a definitive validation of your work... but the basic philosophical problem is that photography, like all art forms, cannot be judged in an absolute

way...There are no measurements that can be made to support unqualified claims of excellence. Judging photography is a matter of taste...A single photo by one great master, such as Ansel Adams, cannot be said to be better than that of another, such as Edward Weston. They are simply different.

It is obviously very satisfying to be patted on the back and told that one has done well.. a boost to our self-esteem...Self-criticism is a vital part of the artistic process but it is a tricky balancing act that can lead to us attacking our own work as worthless. So insightful external criticism from a judge might be valuable and could perhaps help us to achieve new heights both in our mood and in the quality of our work. The key factors here are the quality of the insight and the motive for the judgement.

My own experience is that by entering competition and listening to the more widely experienced, more articulate judges I have learnt the basics of composition; I have gained a better understanding of colour; of camera techniques; the importance of impact in gaining the viewer's attention, and so on. Equally, by reading magazines such as the one I'm quoting from, I see examples of images I would love to emulate but which wouldn't necessarily do much good in club competition. However many of my photos now are pleasing to me regardless of what the camera club judge thinks – because a judge wasn't there "in the moment" – the experience of the particular surroundings, the emotional impact, the wonder of what I'm seeing. How can we separate ourselves from the sentiment involved? We can't – and so we may well disagree with the judge.

David goes on to say: Photo competitions might be beneficial both personally and more widely: they may encourage the production of new, innovative work; might provide insights for the entrant; they will promote the work of the individual winner... and they could promote wider awareness of the art itself.

This next comment by David is pretty much what I used to say, when I was President, to new members who are disappointed with their first results in monthly competition, namely that the scope of camera club competition photography is actually very narrow.

Rather than being engines of innovation, photo competitions often act to normalise – constraining the boundaries of what is considered good rather than expanding them. This is nowhere more apparent than in camera society contests.

How often have we heard a judge try to use objective criteria such as the rule of thirds, an uneven number of trees, a person in a red parka, etc? What happens when the subject of the photo is way outside the judge's own experience? Such formulaic photos can become boring to the club audience, and when I have judged more recently in this arena, I have stated that I am looking for something more interesting, something that shows the photographer is trying to extend his or herself.

Look at a collection of photos by acknowledged masters and ask yourself why, years after the photos were taken, they still resonate. Why are such people considered masters? I encourage those members who are prepared to think outside the square to do so, and to take any critiques on board but without thinking that the night's judge is absolute and infallible. Art can only ever be subjective.
